Are you smouldering? As a child I used to sing the verse; 'Jesus bids us shine' which I probably learnt when attending the Methodist Sunday School. The first verse of this song reads:

Jesus bids us shine with a clear, pure light, Like a little candle burning in the night; In this world of darkness, we must shine, You in your small corner, and I in mine.

We might think it is difficult to shine brightly for the Lord but in many ways for people of faith its as natural as the air we breathe. If you are close to God then you will shine brightly for Him. Jesus taught on the mountainside; "You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5: 14-16, NIV).

Sometimes we might feel that we are not shining very well. Some may even feel that their light is going out! This might particularly be the case if we would normally be very busy serving the Lord in the life and witness of The Salvation Army but can't do so at the present time. It might also be the case for some that faith is wavering and God seems distant. Don't despair! Sometimes we smoulder rather than brightly burn and God uses the bruised and smouldering – Hallelujah!

In Matthew Jesus quotes the Prophet Isaiah (Isaiah 42: 1-4) following his knowledge of the murderous plots of the Pharisees who did not like Jesus' deeds or teaching. In fact these words mark a turning point in the Gospel according to Matthew when Jesus extends his mission to the Gentiles.

To the religious leaders both Jesus and his disciples were smouldering wicks and bruised reeds to be snuffed out and broken. Our heavenly Father has other ideas. God won't break the bruised reed or snuff out the smouldering wick. When we have faith – even a smouldering one – that is enough for God to take and bless; '… he leads justice to victory. In

His name the nations will put their hope.' (Matthew 12: 20-21). Jesus was the bruised reed and smouldering wick – our great Servant King. If you are smouldering today then trust God to trim the wick so you can again burn more brightly. Draw close to God and your shining for Him will be as natural as breathing. A song of Major Joy Webb reads:

How bright the light is from soul to soul:

A myriad tiny flames expanding to a whole,
How strange the truth is when joined as one,
And what a miracle this shining could become;
It could transform the darkness that we know,
And clearly light the way mankind must try to go.

Time to Spare

Following a meeting with Camden Council's Community Response Team this week, Chalk Farm Corps are joining the Camden Food Network. This is a network of organisations that are providing food-related services and provision to the community. Though the initial focus is on food, this will be expanding to other areas of need to include advice, support, and provision of other items and goods.

Chalk Farm Corps now has access to the Time to Spare platform which can:

- Manage referrals that come to the council via the contact centre minimising back and forth emails and calls for referrals.
- Gain a bird's eye view of all capacity of food-related services and provision across the borough
- Access data analytics to help identify trends, gaps, and additional unmet needs of residents
- Monitoring and reporting giving the necessary data and evidence for The Salvation Army to seek additional help or funding to sustain or grow services.

Our initial service appears on the network as a shower and food hub operating on Mondays and Wednesdays and we can accept referrals sent to us or refer others on the network.

I have an adult daughter, Jessica, and enjoy living in North London with the access to all the green spaces, such as Hampstead Heath, Primrose Hill, Regents Park and Regents Canal. I enjoy long walks, preferably with a furry friend, and have walked the entire length of Hadrian's Wall.

It was an exciting time when the volunteers were film celebrities, taking part through Spare Hand. After a couple of mornings together, some say Jude Law is my lookalike.

Supported by Michael and Lorraine, who are just fantastic at this, I began helping and committing not only with the cooking, but also pickup and delivery of care packs, Christmas Appeal, etc.

On came the current lockdown, and rising infection rates, which really affected the ability to continue the evening service for homeless drop in. So, we are now offering a shower booking and take away meal service during the colder months. I am humbled to be able to be a part of such an important community service, have learned so much from Michael and Lorraine during my time volunteering and have met amazing personalities along the way.
