Homelessness Sunday, 8 October

On Sunday 8 October we marked Homelessness Sunday. During the service we watched a film featuring Kings Cross Methodist Church who are part of the winter night shelter scheme, C4WS.

This year Chalk Farm Corps commenced a new partnership with C4WS. The charity operates a Friday Club from our building, offering support to past and present shelter guests. Corporate teams come in to cook a meal, and guests can take a shower and get a change of clothes. Our own Lorraine Kinnear is the C4WS night shelter coordinator and is preparing to open the shelters again at the end of the month. C4WS has a good success rate assisting its guests into accommodation alongside offering tailored support services.

Another initiative for this year is our partnership with Haircuts 4 Homeless, who come in once a month to our Wednesday evening drop-in service. On their last visit three barbers provided 25 haircuts in the 2 hour sitting!

Volunteers are the backbone of our service provision. Eleanor leads the Wednesday evening and Ian helps to co-ordinate Monday evenings. On Wednesdays we also have a volunteer cook, Suzy. Two churches are actively involved in providing volunteers; Liberty Church London and Reality Church (Primrose Hill Community Group).

We are sadly seeing increasing numbers of people accessing our services, with over 50 guests attending some of the drop-in evenings. We offer a welcome to rough sleepers, the housed homeless and the vulnerably housed, providing a brief respite from life on the streets, a freshly cooked meal and refreshments, a shower facility with essential clothing, access to wi-fi and signposting to additional support.


A generous funder has enabled us to continue to provide items such as sleeping bags, underwear and toiletries for our guests who are rough sleeping. With this donation we have also been able to replace our electric oven and purchase other equipment to aid our service delivery. With rising costs from food to utility charges these are difficult times but we trust God will provide for this much needed work to continue.








Since our last newsletter we have had a number of our fellowship called home to be with the LORD. May God bless and comfort the bereaved.
