On the back page is a letter from Major Mark Herbert with a statistic that makes for disturbing reading. 101 officers will retire in the next two years – with only 20 likely to complete officer training to replace them.

If you have been in The Salvation Army for some time this is not a new trend. Just ask retired officers in the Corps how many cadets were in their sessions? It will be in the 100s. This year there may be less than 10.

We will show some clips of a film made about The Salvation Army Training College in 1952. The number of cadets is staggering. The sight of them marching in the open air is a reminder of how much has changed.

Is this an existential threat to the Salvation Army? In one way yes. Simply there will be corps that will have no officers.

Does this mean that God has finished with the Salvation Army? Definitely not.

We want to expand upon what Major Mark writes.

Firstly, we do believe there are people in this Corps that God is calling into full time ministry – a ministry where they will leave this corps, their homes, their families and follow God's call wherever it takes them.

This remains an important part of Salvation Army spiritual leadership. Men and Women who are free from any restrictions and can serve wherever they are called.

Yet it is not the only way.

We also know there are people in the corps who can continue to be part of this corps' ministry or to offer themselves in new ways to serve this corps – or other local corps. Moving to another part of the country is not an option for them – because of family commitments, health, or age. But God has a unique plan for their life.

You will remember the Bible reading.

Readily recognise what he wants from you, and quickly respond to it. (Romans 12:2)

We believe that we are priesthood of all believers.

It is certainly a privilege that we, Carl and Heather, can minister full time. But that is not the only way. Indeed, almost all ministry in the church is by those who juggle with full time work, study, care for others and other factors that restrict the time they have. Without them, this corps would be much the poorer.

So today, on candidates Sunday this is our challenge to the whole church.

What is God calling you to do?

Is he calling you to something new?

Is God calling you to Full time spiritual leadership?

Is God calling you to Local Leadership at Ramsgate Corps?

Is God calling you to become part of our existing work, service, worship or even to start something new?

Pray about these questions and seek confirmation

'Yesterday you said Tomorrow – Just Do it' (With thanks to Nike!) I greet you in the Name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

You may well have come across the above quote from a Nike, the sportswear company's advertising campaign. It challenges us to move beyond the excuses for not exercising (and buy some expenses trainers,) to start running. In our context as a Salvation Army, tomorrow has now arrived in terms of the need to respond to the growing number of leadership opportunities there are within our movement. In terms of The Salvation Army across the United Kingdom and Ireland, during the next two years, 101 officers are due to retire with less than 20% of that number anticipated to be Commissioned. At the January 2024 Appointments Conference there were 39 officer units available for 83 appointments. From a South-East Division perspective, we have a growing number of leadership opportunities. Tomorrow has now arrived in terms of the need for full-time leaders.

There are many ways to fulfil a calling to full-time leadership through The Salvation Army. God is still calling people to Officership and Territorial Envoyship and we celebrate this truth. In our Division, we also have a number of people employed to lead Fresh Expressions of Salvation Army and as Mission Leaders in established Corps. These leaders have a variety of experiences and have been able to bring them into their new roles. We are blessed to have our colleagues as part of our Leaders fellowship.

I now write to you personally. Is there a ministry that God is calling you to? If there is, don't let the detail stop you from making contact. There is the possibility of great flexibility to help you move into the ministry that God has laid upon your heart. Tomorrow has now arrived.
